No-one should routinely manually lift patients. Hoists, sliding aids, electric profiling beds and other specialised equipment are now available as substitutes for manual lifting. Patient manual handling should only continue in cases which do not involve lifting most or all of a patient's weight.

The following major contributors to nurse injuries have been recorded: manual handling of people; muscular stress with no objects being handled; slips, trips and falls; manual handling of trolleys; the use and adjustment of beds; handling of linen and lead aprons. Sprains and strains were the main types of manual handling injury.

With Four Carers Use a hoist and soft stretcher sling to lift the patient a short distance up off the bed. Two carers remove mattress and replace it with new mattress. Also contributing to the negative health consequences of manual handling is the shortage of nurses—Peter Buerhaus, a researcher at Vanderbilt University Medical Center, has estimated that there will be a shortage of 285,000 nurses by the year 2020 and 500,000 by the year 2050 in the US—likely resulting in longer work hours and more demanding schedules for practicing nurses.
