This is a template for formatting a research paper using MLA format. An MLA formatted paper has one-inch margins all around. Each page has the page number in the upper right corner, beginning on the second page.

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An outline sample is at the end of this paper. If required, format a title page according to the instructions you teacher has given. Note each page will have your last name followed by a space and page number, right-justified. Type your name, instructor's name, course number, and the date on separate lines, double-spacing.

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When writing a paper according to the Modern Language Association (MLA) style, sample pages can help you stay on track. While your own teachers' preferences may vary, MLA is the basic form that most teachers use. The parts of a report may include: Title page (only if your teacher asks for one)
